CAREER PATHWAYS TO SUCCESS PROGRAM HAS OFFICIALLY LAUNCHED!

The focus of the program is to support people with disabilities to gain confidence, tools, and resources to pursue their career dreams.

The free 8 Week innovative program officially launched in 2021.



Gardengate

The expansion project for the Gardengate Training Centre has officially completed! The program had been operating out of a 700ft space since 2000 that was largely unusable during winter months due to lack of heat. The space expansion will allow more people to participate in the program. As well, with the new addition of a commercial kitchen, the program gives participants the opportunity to cultivate more skills such as cooking, carpentry, sales, marketing and machine maintenance.

Robert Wright, manager of the program said: "People come to Gardengate to learn, collaborate, purchase produce and connect with the community. Personal wellness and community wellness go hand in hand. Participants leave Gardengate with improved self esteem, greater self sufficiency and vocational skills that prepare them to enter (or re-enter) the workforce."

Ali's Story

Ali was diagnosed with Muscular Dystrophy – a chronic disease that has had a profound effect on his life, most prominently his physical abilities.

Ali was originally working in the pharmaceutical field. When he was diagnosed with muscular dystrophy, this meant that he could no longer meet the requirements of maneuvering in small spaces or using his hands for the delicate handling of medications and therefore needed to rethink his passion and career path in pharmacy.

Despite this, Ali was not discouraged in his employment journey and was motivated to achieve his employment goals, recognizing that many of his skills were transferable and that becoming a counsellor could be a good fit for him.


In January 2022, Ali was thrilled to start his online program. He was connected with WorkBC Assistive Technology services to address his needs before his program start date just before the pandemic began.

"During quarantine I was spending all my time in front of my computer. Without the computer and comfortable desk. I wouldn't have been able to join online school. The equipment was crucial in enabling me to finish the program on time. After graduating from my OST program, I was ready to start looking for a job in the counseling field. My case manager at WorkBC was very supportive in my search, from guiding me in writing a strong cover letter and resume, to helping me search for practicum placements. I ended up receiving two job offers in one month! I received my first Canadian paycheck from my counseling job last July. My proudest moment was then I went to the Ministry to request for them to stop my PWD income since I am now employed. I am so grateful for WorkBC, assistive technology, and all the staff members who supported me on my journey to success!"




